Race Project

Pre-Covid Race Project hosted, pre-visits with each participating school, 2 workshops for 3 student cohorts, and a special student input planning session for a segregation tabletop game. In total 351 students and teachers were impacted. The third workshop and symposium were canceled. In November 2020 Race Project resumed with a virtual Identity workshop. 114 students and 16 educators attended.
